#### The Christmas Carol

Many years before the early Christians sang carols, pagan songs were sung at the winter solstice, December 22, the shortest day of the year, as people danced around stone circles. It was not until the 12th Century that carols were formally introduced to church services. St. Francis of Assisi inspired composers and poets to deliver Christmas music. However it was not until the 14th century that the lighter, more joyous, carols were first sung.

It is thought the word "carol" is derived from the old French word "caroller" to dance around in a circle or "dance or song of praise." This in turn was derived from Latin "choraula" and the Greek "choraules".

During the Cromwellian period carols were banned but they were still sung in secret and so survived to this day.

The first public carol singers were called "waits", bands of singers made up of important local leaders. They only sang on Christmas Eve, often known as "waitnight" or "watchnight" because of the shepherds watching their sheep when the angels appeared.

Probably the best known carol, "Silent Night", was written by Joseph Mohr in 1818. Originally written in German, today it is sung in more than 180 languages. New traditions such as Carols by Candlelight have also become part of our Christmas celebrations.

#### David Brady- Chairman of the Board Deafness Forum Australia - Meeting at Donald Simpson Community Centre

On October 29<sup>th</sup> a meeting was held at the Donald Simpson Community Centre to promote the installation of communication access systems within the Centre. These will assist people with hearing loss when they attend meetings and activities at the Centre.

Audio induction loops have been installed, and FM systems are available. A counter loop is also available at Reception. The installation of communication systems in Redland City Council facilities was also acknowledged.

Tony Christinson, Chairman of the DSCC, pointed out that Peter and Jill's persistence in explaining the need for people with hearing loss to have assistance is commendable and the main reason that this has eventuated.

He also could not understand why some people could not see the reasoning behind this as it was obvious to all, that as a person in a wheel chair needed a ramp to get into the centre, a person with hearing loss would need assistance to hear.

It is believed that this action by the Centre and the Council has set a benchmark in communication access provision, ensuring social inclusion for those who have a hearing loss. Hopefully, other organisations will follow, knowing that the outcome is more than positive. While this remarkable achievement is an overwhelming success, all agreed that this is only the tip of the iceberg in relation to other matters that effect people with a hearing loss.

During his comments to the group, David mentioned the importance of lobbying the Federal Government for Hearing Loss to become the 10<sup>th</sup> National Health Priority - given the high incidence of hearing loss, its predicted increase across all ages, the implications for health and the importance of addressing the isolation and social exclusion that is often currently the lot of those with hearing loss.

The meeting was Captioned, had a Auslan interpreter and trialed a desktop loop device.

#### THANK YOU FOR THE MEN.


