

State Government Provides Emergency Funding to Centre

As a direct result of the petition presented by Kim Richards, Candidate for Redland, Minister for Communities, Coralee O'Rourke has presented the Donald Simpson Centre with a one-off grant of \$25 000.

Board Chairman, Tony Christinson, said, in accepting the grant, that the Board and members of the Centre were extremely grateful for this assistance.

"An untied grant such as this, used as operational funding, should enable us to balance our books in 2017-18 with some carry-over into the following year when the full force of the Redland Council's \$100 000 removal of funding really hits us," Mr Christinson said.

Current Member for Redland, Matt McEachan, has told the Centre that the LNP will match the grant if they win office at the next election.

"These are on-off grants for which we are extremely thankful," said Mr Christinson, "but we need annual funding such as we were receiving and such as other community groups continue to receive."

"I have said before that this Centre was planned and built by the Shire Council, as it was then, and the community specifically as a hedge against social isolation in the community."

"The Centre was funded with Council, state and federal funds and entrusted to the Council as a community service; the Council, in turn, opted to co -opt volunteers to manage and run the Centre."

"The present Council, in backing away from this trust has jeopardised the future of the Centre as it now exists if the Board is not able to secure ongoing operational funds. This will be a great loss to the Redlands community."

The 2017 Annual General Meeting was well attended enabling the business to be completed with little fuss. Apart from the usual Chairman's, Manager's and Financial reports, important business included the appointment of three new Life Members, 2 rule changes and the election of the Centre Board for 2017-18.

Successful 2017 AGM

Life Members

Three Life Members were appointed this year. They were **Lyn Finn, Val Henry and Noni Silman.** All three have been Board Members, have volunteered at the Centre over a long period of time and are well-known to our members for their untiring and dedicated work on our Out With a Difference and Away With a Difference trips. Congratulations to all three.



Rule Changes

Rule changes were introduced to change the requirement to advertise the AGM in local print media to the broader requirement to advertise by digital means and a second change to limit proxies held by an individual at a DSCC meeting to two.

Other Business

The Chairman's and Manager's reports are reproduced in this newsletter for the information of members. A full Audited Financial Report will be posted on our website but a condensed version of our financial position is included with the other reports.

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Chairman's Report to AGM

As I mentioned in beginning last year's report, so much flashes by when considering a year just passed. The last year at the Donald Simpson Centre has proved no exception. We've seen growth in membership and activities, changes in the gardens around the Centre and many more physical changes including our digital sign facing onto Bloomfield Street. We have also added two part-time Caretaker/cleaners to our staff to ensure the safety of members who attend the Centre in those afterhours activities and functions which were previously unsupervised.

In last year's report, I spoke with some optimism of the Community Hub development. Unfortunately, since then, after considerable consultation with members, the Centre Board notified the Redlands Council of its wish to withdraw from further consideration of the project as it had developed whilst stating our willingness to consider alternative proposals. Until recently, we were not involved in any further hub discussions but a proposal has now been suggested for discussion about a reduced hub concept involving only a few original local organisations. These discussions are continuing and members will be kept informed of their progress.

It is also my duty to record that, as most of you will know by now, that the Redlands Council has advised the Centre that they will change their funding support by reducing our annual benefit from around \$100 000 to \$50 000 in financial year 2017-2018 and to zero thereafter. This is a severe blow to a Centre with annual receipts of under \$400 000 a year. It has already meant that we have had to increase our activity fee by \$1 to \$5 and increase the costs for some of our events.

We have plans to install a 74kW/hr solar system on our roof which is at present going through various stages of approval some of which are significantly adding to the cost. When installed, this system has the ability to save us tens of thousands of dollars in energy costs. Developments such as this have been in our plans for quite some time but were initially delayed by the Hub proposal and our need to spend members' funds judiciously while retaining a buffer of funds against any development which could close the Centre for a period of time with little or no activity.

This, of course, explains the funds which some have claimed we were reluctant to spend but will now cause us to seek various other ways to raise funds for the Centre's survival. We are actively seeking public support from grants and sponsorships, conscious that grants can only apply to capital expenditure and not to ongoing expenses and are difficult to obtain and that sponsorships are difficult to achieve in a small area such as Redland City. While, as you will see from our financial papers, I was able to sign , on behalf of the Board, that we have sufficient funds to pay all of our debts, our situation may be quite different at our next AGM.

While these developments are of concern to our members, the Board and the general community, the daily activities at the Centre have been well-attended and the general atmosphere at the Centre has remained a pleasure to experience. Our membership has continued to thrive, we have seen people of a range of ages and abilities attending the Centre and we show every sign of growth in support from the ever-growing group of elders of our community and success in inviting some younger members to participate in the Centre's daily life.

Our Hub Café continues to develop in offerings and custom thanks to our hardworking staff. It's my pleasure to thank all of our volunteers, kitchen staff, conveners, tour organisers, reception staff, general office volunteers, gardeners and other miscellaneous volunteers for their untiring and Centre-sustaining efforts throughout the year and for all the years before.

Once again, I have to record my thanks and admiration for the work of our employees, Thomas, Vanessa, Ann, Paul and Trevor for their special contributions to the Centre. We could not do without their efficiency and dedication. Our members are our reason for being here and I thank you for your cheerfulness as you pass through the Centre and participate in your chosen activities. Your support in upholding the special nature of this Centre is welcome and much appreciated. I hope we can live up to your expectations in keeping this as a social meeting place for the Redlands Community. This brings me to my colleagues on the Board. We have faced some trying times and tough decisions and I thank each and every one of you for your contribution to such a cohesive and friendly group with which to work.

Other reports will further round out the Centre's past year so it remains for me to say thanks for bearing with me for a further year; it has been a pleasure to be here and I hope we can continue to grow physically and economically but also in a spirit of which we can continue to be proud but not complacent.

Manager's Report to AGM

Greetings and Welcome to the members, volunteers, and the Board of the Donald Simpson Centre. Welcome to the 30th AGM of Donald Simpson Community Centre. As I had mentioned last year, we have successfully had a series of events to mark our 30th anniversary celebration. The centre continues to grow as this financial year our membership tally was around 2320 members, which included people from outside the Redlands to enjoy one of the many activities Donald Simpson Centre provides. I take this opportunity to highlight our past year as briefly as possible.

Centre Improvements

Along with the Board, I am proud that we have brought in quite a few additions/changes to our Centre for the members. Our improvements include:

- · Air-conditioning in the Café Foyer Area
- · Bus Shelter on entrance at DSC
- · Building of additional storage areas
- · State of the Art Board Room facility
- Digital Sign & Magnetic Sign Board to advertise DSC activities
- New Café tables and chairs
- New front garden at entrance & herb garden
- New Website & Social Media presence

Mentioned above are a just few among the many works that have happened around the Centre, all of which have been timely planned and approved by the Board, for the benefit of our members and to keep the Centre thriving.

Community Events & Support

The Centre supports not just the regular activities, but plays an active role in the community. This year the Centre, with the assistance of our convenors, raised over \$3800 for the Cancer Council and distributed over 800 blankets through our annual Ernie Harrison Blanket Drive. The Centre is also home for organisations such as Cleveland Senior Citizens, certain U3A activities, Genealogy Society, Redland Orchid Society.

DSC is proud to take on board 6 intellectually disabled individuals from Redlands Respite Centre

who come to our Woodcarving to develop their skills, interact with people and learn from our seniors. This project is now ongoing after completing a successful trial period. All 6 individuals are members of DSC too whose age range is from 18yrs to 30 years.

Trips

During the last financial year, we had 2660 people attend our Day trips, and 148 people attend our overseas trips. It goes without saying how much these social outings mean to our members but it wouldn't be possible without the tireless works of our Day Trip Coordinator Mrs Lyn Finn and Away With A Difference Coordinator Val Henry. On behalf of the Board and Management, I thank Lyn and Val for their outstanding work in assisting the Centre to put on these trips for our members.

Activities

We have been continuously growing with our activities and introducing new activities as per demand or request by members. Our project of focussing on wellness of our members and seniors is going well and we now have one or more wellness activities between Monday to Saturday scheduled. We are starting to become popular during after hours, as on Tuesdays and Fridays we are open until 9.30pm. This year our new project is to introduce more forum or discussion group type activities. We have a retired psychologist joining us on board to help facilitate a group, mainly to make sure people have some sort of support group during a time of need for them. Apart from those, all activities are running well, with some running on full capacity. Many of our members and activities do a lot of charity work for other local and international organisations. All these are coordinated within their activities by a group of people for a common cause. It's so big that I won't

be able to mention it all here but I thank all members for their initiative. I also thank my convenors for their ongoing dedication and commitment to the centre.

Seniors Week

This year, once again our Seniors Week has been a busy time. Our four Theatrical Shows "Simply the Best" have been yet another successful production. Special thanks to Janette Sheehan and all the Theatricals crew who have put together a great show. This is one of the biggest fundraisers for the

centre, and we had over 750 people attend over the four shows.

The Arts & Craft show has also displayed a wonderful exhibition by Art work, Matilda's Quilters, Handicrafts, Parchmentcraft, Leatherwork, Woodwork and Jewellery. Donald Simpson Centre is not short of talent between theatricals and crafts group and I thank everyone involved in putting together a great weekend.

Members Café

This is now the most popular and busiest area of the Centre. Our café now is able to provide a variety of delicacies and our monthly Chef's Special has been hugely popular. We had one of the busiest times with all our Christmas Bookings last year too. Our Café also caters now for various functions, which include New Members Morning Tea, Cabarets, Expos, and other special events. None of these would have been possible without the 40 plus volunteers, who work in the kitchen during the week, and many of whom now extend their support for evening and weekend functions. I extend my sincere gratitude and thanks to all my volunteers. A special mention and thanks to our chef Ann Mason, who had a busy year coordinating all this and the staff, but still manages to serve our members with a smile.

Promotion

Over the past two years and in various newsletters I have highlighted the point of branding Donald Simpson Centre. Finances

The Audited Financial report is far too long for a newsletter. The full report will be posted on our website with appropriate explanation.

Some brief excerpts are included here.

In a year in which we received \$96 979 from the Redland City Council, our annual net operating surplus was \$70 994.14. Part of this is due to reduced electricity costs of around \$25,860 and credit for \$21,628.71 because of previous years of overcharging .

Our Balance Sheet showed Total accumulated Funds of \$346 945.42 which allowed the Board to declare that the centre is in a position to pay all its debts and is financially sound for the beginning of the 2017-18 financial year.

Government releases aged care funding report

The Federal Minister for Aged Care, Ken Wyatt, released a report into the alternative approaches to aged care funding yesterday, two months after it was originally delivered.

The report, prepared by the Australian Health Services Research Institute at the University of Wollongong, outlines five suggestions for improving the Aged Care Funding Instrument (ACFI), which it states is "no longer fit for purpose".

The report states that the current model doesn't adequately categorise residents based on their care needs, with one third of all residents classified to just one ACFI payment class, with 63 classes rarely claimed.

One of the suggested options includes adopting the four funding levels currently in place for home care packages, but with pricing reflecting the higher cost of residential care. Another option suggests implementing an activity-based funding system similar to that used in hospitals.

A further option includes refining the current ACFI system, with ongoing monitoring to avoid cost blow-outs.

Mr Wyatt said the Government currently contributes \$17.5 billion a year towards aged care, and that this figure was set to grow to just under \$21 billion by 2020.

"It's important that we review the way we fund aged care to ensure we create an aged care system that is affordable, sustainable, flexible and responsive to consumers," Mr Wyatt said.

"In 2015–16, more than 1.3 million older people received some form of aged care and with more Australians living longer and healthier lives, those numbers will increase.

"To meet the level of demand for aged care services now and into the future the Australian Government needs to make sure its funding gives the best possible value for money."

A separate review of the current Aged Care Funding Instrument is also being undertaken by Applied Aged Care Solutions.

"That review will focus on options to improve the current tool to make it less subjective, including the feasibility of external assessment," Minister Wyatt said.

"These two separate but important pieces of work will help inform the Government's deliberations over the future direction for funding reform.

"The aged care sector will continue to play a key role in this reform and there will be further consultation with the sector before any decisions are made on funding options."

Aged care: changes to home care put consumers in charge

Older Australians who rely on help around the home now have more choice in how their home care packages are delivered. How will these changes benefit consumers?

Announced as part of the 2015/16 Federal Budget, the first stage of the Increasing Choice in Home Care measure was implemented on 27 February 2017. From this date, individual consumers now have control of the budget or their home care packages, rather than approved providers, which was the previous provision.

The change means that consumers can choose a provider to ensure they receive the services they require, delivered by a means that suits them best. Consumers can now simply advise the Government how they wish the funds to be distributed.

The move not only gives the consumer control of their own home care budget, it also means that if they receive poor service, they can easily switch providers. Also, should the consumer move, either within their own state or interstate, the home care package can simply be transferred.

The change is expected to benefit more than 100,000 customers over the next year and the outlined changes mean:

- funding for home care packages is fully portable
- when changing providers, any unspent funds less account fees will be directed to their new provider

• process for becoming a new provider will be more streamlined

After an overnight here we travel back to Vancouver via the Capilano Suspension Bridge where we board the "Star Princess" for our cruise to Alaska. Ports of call include Juneau, Skagway, and Anchorage. We fly back from Anchorage to Vancouver to connect with our flight to Brisbane.
